

New Minimum Wage

INCORPORATED

The minimum wage in New York is going up!

In New York City:

- If you work for a big employer (11 or more employees), the minimum wage will be \$11 per hour in 2017.
- If you work for a small employer (10 employees or fewer) in New York City, the minimum wage will be \$10.50 per hour in 2017.
- Minimum Wage rates will go up every year until they reach \$15.00 per hour:

Greater New York State	\$9.70	\$10.40	\$11.10	\$11.80	\$12.50	*

^{*} Annual increases for the rest of the state will continue until the rate reaches \$15 minimum wage.

There are some exceptions to these rates. For example, if you get tips, your employer may be able to pay you less, as long as you make minimum wage with the tips. Also, some home care workers' base wage rates may be different from the minimum wage if they also get benefits such as health insurance.

You have a right to minimum wage regardless of immigration status.
