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MFY and Chinatown Tenants Demand Safe Housing



MFY Attorney Shi Shi Wang represents tenants of two Chinatown buildings who <u>rallied on September 22</u> to draw attention to two lawsuits they have filed against the landlord, R.A. Cohen, for failing to address building code violations that have made the buildings unfit for human habitation. Tenants cited mold, pests, crumbling cabinets and defective appliances as persistent problems. The Committee Against Anti-Asian Violence is working with the tenants, who are represented by MFY and the Urban Justice Center. Ms. Wang and others spoke about the problems and the

MFY Aids Tenants Suing Slumlord for Creating Illegal SRO

MFY is representing a group of tenants at 80 New York Avenue in Brooklyn who are suing their landlord for renting out individual rooms within apartments as if they are separate dwelling spaces, alleging illegal deregulation and rent overcharges. In a scheme proliferating in many gentrifying neighborhoods, landlords convince single adults desperate for an affordable place to live to co-sign a lease. Tenants say the group lease is a cover for a living arrangement that looks more like an illegal rooming house. The <u>exposé in The</u> <u>Gothamist</u> and an <u>article in The Real Deal</u> show how in 2014 the eight-unit building was entirely rent-stabilized. Eighteen months later all but three apartments are rented by the room, at rents three to four times the rent-stabilized rate, thereby reducing the stock of available apartments low-income New Yorkers can rent.
